### Atlantic Ocean Perch


### **Supply**

- Atlantic Ocean Perch or Redfish is primarily caught in Iceland (67%), followed by Canada (14%), the Faroe Islands (8%) and Norway (7%) Figure 1.
- Catches of Icelandic Redfish also referred to as Golden Redfish - have been declining since 2005.
- Iceland also lands Oceanic Redfish deemed to be of slightly lesser quality than Golden Redfish.
- Oceanic Redfish supply is growing offsetting reduced Golden Redfish supply.


#### **Demand**

- Germany and Japan are major markets for both species of Icelandic Redfish, followed by other nations in Western Europe. The bulk of H&G fish goes to Asia for reprocessing.
- Since July-2011, Icelandic Redfish prices have trended down (Figure 2). This is attributed to rising competition with alternate species, as well as reduced consumer spending due to the recession.



• In the US, most frozen fillet blocks are imported from China and most frozen fillets come from Canada. Early 2012 prices are higher than in 2010 and 2011 - Figure 3.

#### **Projections**

- Declining Golden Redfish supply may put upward pressure on prices or lead North American and EU
  buyers to switch to alternative speices, such as Pangasius & Tilapia. Oceanic Redfish is deemed to be of
  lesser quality in these regions and increased catches will have a minimal impact on these markets.
- Instead, increased catches of Oceanic Redfish will go to Japan. Japan has demonstrated an increased preference the Oceanic species and exports to this market have been growing.
